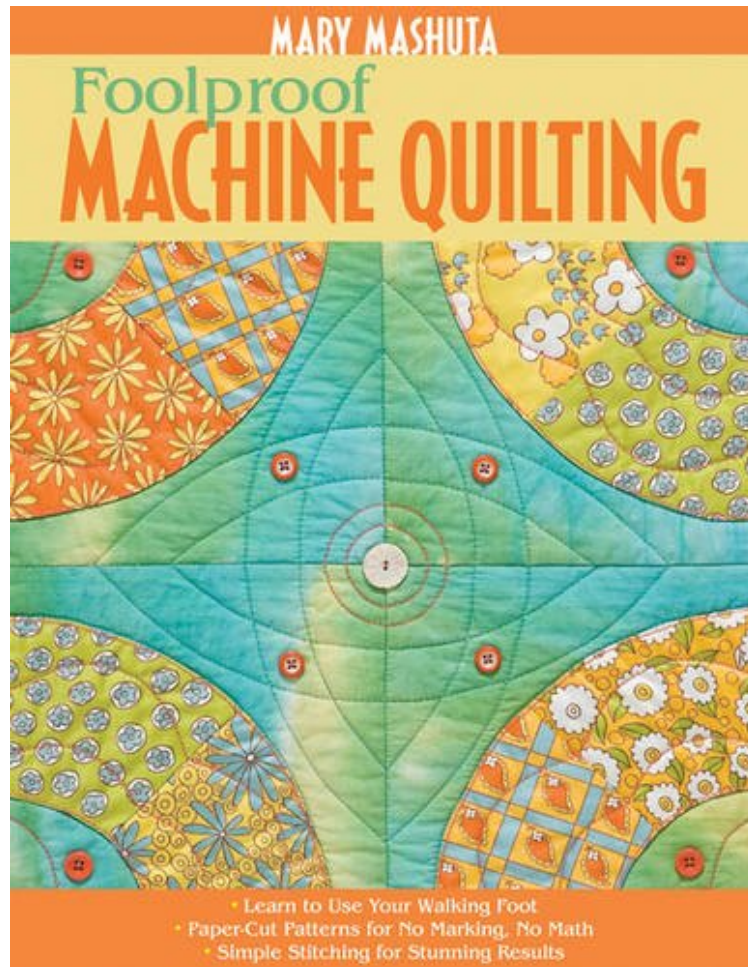

The up close photos are wonderful and she breaks down how many templates it actually took to make the look in a given block. She also gives hints on less than perfect blocks. She talks about different weights of thread/color and how it changes the look. Cons: the full quilt pictures are so small that some of the quilting completely disappears. She doesn't show how she was able to maneuver the quilt in the actual harp space of her machine. I plan to try her template techniques with both the walking foot and free motion quilting. For me, this was a how did she get that look with minimal effort and extra added expense book.
